## HEAT AND HYDRATION!

As the summer temperatures begin to climb, keeping hydrated and cool while working can be a challenge. Heat illness can be deadly, so make heat safety a part of every job.



To avoid heat exhaustion:

- Drink water often, even if you aren't thirsty
- Rest in the shade to cool down
- Report heat symptoms early
- Know what to do in an emergency

If you have a headache, feel dizzy or weak, have clammy skin or are sick to your stomach, you could have heat exhaustion. You should:

- Move immediately to the shade and lay down on your back with your feet elevated 6-8 inches.
- Loosen heavy clothing
- Drink some cool water (a small cup every 15 minutes)
- Cool your skin with a fan, spray mist or damp rag
- If you do not feel better in a few minutes, call for emergency help.

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## HARBORMASTER'S VIEW

With the warm weather on the horizon, we have more boaters out on the water to beat the heat. Please remember to be courteous and careful by practicing patience (something you want a lot of but never want to have to use).



It's also great to see tenants cleaning their boats and preparing for summer. If you are using boat soap, remember to check the label. You might think "biodegradable" soap is acceptable to use, but check the caution label. If the caution label says eye and skin irritant, or harmful if swallowed, it's not environmentally safe. Find a boat soap that says DOE approved or EPA approved. A quick internet search will help with this.

Safety, as always, is paramount on the water. Don't forget to wear a life jacket on your boat. A life jacket in the bow of your boat isn't going to help you in an emergency situation. Wearing it may save your life. Additional safety from the Marina Policy Manual reminds moorage tenants that they are required to keep their boat, dock box, and the pier or finger in the vicinity of their boat "shipshape" and warns not to store gear in the rafters of the dock, as this is a safety hazard. No one ever plans on having an accident so safety prior to heading out on the water is of the utmost importance. With that being said, in an emergency situation, would the Port be able to contact you? Please be sure we have several points of contact for you.

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## SALE OF BOAT OR AIRCRAFT



Port procedure for the sale of a boat or airplane requires that tenants notify the port office and come in with the new owner if they wish to lease the slip or hangar. If the new owner will not be leasing the slip or hangar, the tenant is required to give us a 30-day notice. If the lease has not yet expired, the tenant is responsible for the remainder of the lease. To transition the slip or hangar into the new owner's name, the port requires a bill of sale, first months payment, registration, insurance and photo ID with a new lease for the new tenant.
